What impact has pupil premium had on pupils 2019-2020

- Achievement data continues to outweigh behaviour data suggesting a positive environment with progress for all, in all progress measures.
- Reintegration continues to increase with more learners being successful in their mainstream placements and securing single registration at mainstream schools post a period at The Bridge.

Outcomes/Impact

- 26% of learners reintegrated into mainstream schools at KS3
- Every Y11 learner achieved accreditation at GCSE and post 16 placements
- Progress of PP learners in line with non PP learners

Planning for 2020 -2021

Details of the main barriers to educational achievement that the disadvantaged children in your school face.

Many of the learners at The Bridge AP Academy are disadvantaged and face a range of social, emotional, mental health and behavioural challenges. Learners face complex family situations, and by the time they reach us have experiences of failure and rejection, challenges to learning, and at times, involvement in antisocial behaviour.

How you will spend your pupil premium funding to address these barriers and the reasons for the approach you've chosen

Pupil premium funding is used in order to close the gap and raise aspirations to improve young peoples' life chances by providing an equal starting platform for all learners every day. We do this through the provision of food for all learners throughout the school day. The school day starts at 8:30 with the provision of hot breakfast and learners are given a hot meal at lunchtime, this is served by the HoS and all staff and all learners eat together as they would in a family at meal times. This prepares all learners for learning throughout the day and creates a sense of nurture and harmony within the whole school community.

The impact of pupil premium is measured holistically through learners' attendance, behaviour, curriculum progress, literacy, enrichment, and reintegration. The performance and progress of pupil premium groups is

tracked and reviewed against other groups termly to ensure that it is in line with other groups within the school.

How you will measure the impact of the pupil premium?

A range of measures to monitor the progress of our learners have been developed and approaches to assessment should be holistic. We have developed an approach which allows us to measure the impact of our work on all groups, including learners entitled to PP in the following ways:

- Attendance
- Curriculum Progress
- Literacy
- Behaviour for learning
- Enrichment
- Reintegration
- Exclusion
- GCSE outcomes
- Post 16 pathways - % NEET
